Three Thoughts About God's Love For February

Walk into any store in the US in the month of February and you're bound to find a display designed to remind you how you can show your sweetheart your love and affection via chocolates, stuffed animals, flowers, or cards. As soon as the Christmas decorations are packed up, it seems that Valentine's Day is "next up" in the seasonal aisle. While the over-commercialization of the holiday can be irritating, Valentine's Day can be a great time to reflect on love. Here are three simple thoughts about God's Love for you to think about this month.

There are many different types of love in the Bible, and different Greek words to express it. The highest and holiest form of love is agape love. Agape love is perfect, and sacrificial. Agape love is more than just mere sentiment. Agape love is shown through action. Something to try: write the word agape on a paper heart and put it somewhere you'll see it as a reminder to practice and share God's love with all.

The Bible tells us that God and love are inseparable. The book of 1 John, chapter 4, verse 16 says this God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. (NRSV). God and love are the same. If we feel love, we feel God and if we feel God, we feel love. If you're having trouble discerning whether something is from God or not, ask yourself if it feels loving or not. Something to try: Try to memorize this verse. It's short and easy to remember. Try saying it every morning when you wake up and every evening when you go to sleep. If you do it every day for a week, you will have the verse memorized!

The famous "love passage" in the Bible is 1 Corinthians chapter 13. It begins "Love is patient. Love is kind." Though it is often read at weddings, it's a passage less about romantic love and more about the holy and pure agape love we mentioned earlier. It's a beautiful passage to think about and to practice. Something to try: Write down all of the qualities of love, in addition to patience and kindness. Put your list somewhere you can see it to remind you of God's love.

Happy Valentine's Day, Friends! God loves you! Have fun as you consider ways to share God's love today and every day.

Bound Together: Clothed in Christ


Colossians 3:12-15

In discussion with Pastor Mandy, I have decided to provide coaching to church members, who are interested in participating, as a focus group to how a Christian coaching ministry might take shape in our community.


My hope is that as this grows and develops, I can provide coaching to church members in exchange for donations to a discipleship ministry fund. This discipleship ministry fund could be used to provide training small groups, and purchasing teaching materials.

If you are interested in individual coaching, whether in your job, in decisions you are making, or problems you are facing, such as grief or work/life balance, I will be happy to help you develop a richer understanding, explore different perspectives or options, and grow in your relationship with Jesus. VOICE UPDATE



As our MCOB VOICE Core Team, we have been working with VOICE on Affordable Housing, and Decriminalizing Mental Illness. These are the victories we have had with VOICE in 2021.

Stopping the incarceration of those needing mental health and addiction treatment:

\$12 million in state funding to create Crisis Receiving Centers (CRCs) across Virginia, so that people who are suffering from mental illness and addiction can get treatment and support instead of being incarcerated.

VOICE is not alone in recognizing that CRCs play a critical role—this is also a major issue for law enforcement officials in Virginia, some of whom have aligned with VOICE on this issue.

We are on our way to building the first CRC in Prince William County, one of America's most racially diverse counties. VOICE has partnered with the Prince William County Board of Supervisors, and the Board has prioritized the CRC project as a future funding priority. VOICE's organizing has played a critical role in bringing this about.

Expanding into the Shenandoah Valley:

VOICE has begun working with a new group in the rural Shenandoah Valley named Faith in Action, VOICE's first sister organization in Virginia. Two Churches of the Brethren are part of this group: Bridgewater CoB and Harrisonburg First CoB, and we are excited to have more Church of the Brethren sisters and brothers who are a part of this work. This winter FIA is launching a major Valley-wide listening campaign to determine its issue agenda for 2022.

Bringing more affordable housing to Prince William County:

Our VOICE Core team met with other VOICE leaders in Prince William County at the beginning of December to understand more about bringing affordable housing to our community. We are looking forward to working on this more in the new year.


